How To Use These Spreads

Welcome to the Major Arcana of The Tarot. No matter which deck you choose, you will find these cards in that deck. To use these spreads, pull out the Major Arcana that you want to work with and put that card in front of you before you shuffle the rest of your deck and pick the cards that correspond with the numbers in the spread. Focus on the energy of the card and allow yourself you see what about the card draws your attention. It could be a symbol, a color or maybe even a thought comes to mind. You can keep a journal next to you and do some automatic writing before your do your spread. By doing automatic writing, you are allowing your Higher Self to give you messages about the question you are asking of the Major Arcana. I wrote the questions as a guideline. You may ask those specific questions or you can formulate the questions to correspond with the question you want to ask. Tarot can give you answers as long as you know how to ask the right questions. Write your question down before asking. Keep the questions to the point and allow the cards to connect with you and reveal your answer. Tarot does not give yes or no answers, but more of a guide for you to understand the energies that are surrounding you at the time you are asking the question. Spend some time exploring each card. Meditate on the energy and absorb the image on the card inside your mind.

How To Get Answers from The Tarot Without Having a Deck

Did you know that you don't have to have a Tarot deck on you to consult the Tarot? This is where getting to know each card comes into play, but it does take time. All you need to do is pick a card each day and look at it. Meditate on it. Use the cards name when asking a question For example, "High Priestess, please tell me what I need to know about this situation." What does it mean to you? Keep in mind that the traditional meanings of the card don't always apply since the cards work for you and you may have come up with your own meaning of the card and that is perfectly okay. Once you have a card absorbed into your minds eye, then you can close your eyes, and call upon that card in your mind while you are thinking of a question or need an answer. This process takes time but can be very rewarding once you have all of the cards absorbed into your energy. Don't put too much pressure on yourself to memorize the meanings of the cards. Instead focus on absorbing the image of the card along with the question you ask of the card as well as the answer you get. Your life is a journey and Tarot maps that out for you. Enjoy the journey!

The Court Cards

The court cards that you pull to fill in your spread are separated into the suits of Fire (Wands), Air (Swords), Water(Cups) and Earth (Pentacles). They help to clarify the answers you get.

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


The Swords: Air Energy: Libra, Aquarius, Gemini


